



MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT & CEO

N MAY 21, 2022, THE NEW ROYAL AVIATION MUSEUM OPENED TO THE PUBLIC, FULFILLING A NEARLY 20-YEAR DREAM OF THE BOARD AND STAKEHOLDERS. THEN, BETWEEN MAY AND DECEMBER, WE WELCOMED MORE THAN 65.000 VISITORS.

Opening our new museum and having an incredibly successful first seven months could not have happened without the dedication of our board members-both past and present-our campaign cabinet, volunteers and staff, and our construction and architect project partners including PCL, Architecture49, Reich + Petch International and Kubik-Maltbie.

Our Capital Campaign committee has done an outstanding job, raising \$47.2M of \$48M to date, enabling us to create a world-class facility and exhibits. Thank you to our *Climb Aboard! Capital Campaign* Co-Chairs Ross Robinson and Blain King, and Honorary Chair Hartley Richardson, for their leadership of a stellar team who rose to the challenge.

The lead-up to our grand opening was a busy time for our entire team. Our facilities and collections teams worked with contractors to finalize and assemble exhibits and ready the building for visitors. Volunteers did a fantastic job assembling the Bellanca Aircruiser and cleaning aircraft prior to opening, and the marketing team worked hard to get the word out about our new facility. Team members from all departments jumped in as needed to lend a helping hand.

After our grand opening, we hosted popular special events for Father's Day and the arrival of the Electra, as well as a Hobbs-themed Halloween event.

We also made significant advancements on the RAMWC Centre of Excellence, the mission of which is to educate and inspire students to pursue careers in aviation and aerospace, and connect them to these types of opportunities. We're especially focused on engaging underrepresented groups such as Indigenous and female students.

To start, we added five new STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) programs to our educational program offerings. More than 5,000 students have already enrolled in these programs and we expect to register at least 3,000 more by the end of the 2022-2023 school year.

We also forged strategic relationships with key educational institutions in Winnipeg and look forward to collaborating with them in the coming months.

Our commitment to truth and reconciliation led to new and strengthened relationships with Indigenous communities as we continued to incorporate Indigenous perspective and stories into our museum. Notable accomplishments for 2022 include making plans for a memorial on Linwood Street to honour eight Indigenous residential school students who died in a plane crash 50 years ago, and identifying two Pikangikum First Nation community members from a 1922 photo in our collection. We gave the Chief of Pikangikum these photos of his ancestors and they are now the oldest photos in the community.

Finally, the museum migrated from being supported by the Capital Campaign while we were closed to a sustainable funding model comprised of 12 revenue streams. We are not a publicly-funded museum, with only 5%-10% of our annual operating budget coming from government sources. The museum has been sustainable under this model for 49 years and will continue to be. Our revenue streams include paid attendance, annual passes, venue rentals, parking, and the ongoing generosity of our donors. In fact, nearly 40% of our revenue comes from individuals, corporations, and foundations.

As we look toward 2023, keeping visitors engaged will be top-of-mind. Plans are being developed to host visiting aircraft, special events, and to display additional aircraft from our collection in the museum.

In closing, I would like to thank our board, volunteers, staff, partners, visitors, and donors for their ongoing support. We could not achieve our mission to educate, inspire, and entertain without you.

The museum on Ferry Road held decades of stories of which volunteers were a huge part and the new museum is no different. Every inch of our new space has been touched, or enhanced by, this dedicated team.

Our team of front-of-house volunteers is made up of greeters, ticketing and gift shop attendants, gallery interpreters, and tour guides. They keep our operations running smoothly, answer visitor questions about our facilities and aircraft, and provide engaging tours that inspire our visitors.

In the Collections Department, volunteers spend hours scanning photographs for display and digitization and were indispensable when it came time to unpack boxes as we moved our collection to the new museum during the summer and fall of 2022. These volunteers also help maintain our collection on display.

At our off-site facilities, volunteers work diligently to restore aircraft and artefacts for eventual display in the museum. They track down photos and drawings to maintain the integrity of the artefact throughout the restoration process, source hardto-find parts, and consult with historians. Some of these volunteers also participate in public programming by coming to the museum to do demonstrations for visitors and talk about their projects.

Many of our volunteers have been with the museum for years and were all happy to return to the work they had been doing in the old space: scanning, cataloguing, inventorying, and other archival work. We also saw a number of new volunteers join our team in 2022.

It's inspiring to see the enthusiasm and knowledge volunteers bring to the museum. We're so grateful to all of them.

To date, \$21M has come from the three levels of government and more than \$26M has come from individuals, foundations, and corporations.

We are particularly grateful to Bob Williams and the Richardson Foundation who funded giving matches totaling \$1.35M. This leveraged an additional \$1.35M from hundreds of donors and brought us closer to our goal of \$48M. Their matches both came at a time when the campaign needed a boost to maintain momentum and progress.

Reaching our campaign goal of \$48M will enable us to pay off the new building and exhibits and provide for a \$5M endowment. This endowment income will contribute to our museum's long-term sustainability by providing an income stream in perpetuity.

More importantly, the museum will have the foundation to achieve its mission to preserve and promote the stories of western and northern Canadian aviation

The endowment fund will also allow the museum to play an important role in the continued success of Manitoba's aviation and aerospace sector. We've made a commitment to industry partners to inspire students to pursue aviation and aerospace careers, bolstering this important sector and the Manitoba economy.

As we look toward 2023, we're on track to reach our \$48M goal and will begin to shift our attention to raising funds in support of the museum's *Take Flight!* education programming. These programs are the backbone of the RAMWC Centre of Excellence and its mission to educate and inspire students in the coming years.

In closing, we would like to thank all of our donors, the Campaign Cabinet, and the RAMWC board and staff for contributing to the success of the Climb Aboard! Capital Campaign.

THE RICHARDSON MATCH

n May of 2022, with the new museum opening around the corner and the 'Climb Aboard! Capital Campaign' runway in sight, the Richardson Foundation offered up a \$750,000 matching gift.

Our iconic building at the Winnipeg Richardson International Airport was designed to be a welcoming and accessible space for all who come through our museum. Our visitors come from a variety of demographic backgrounds and we know not everyone will be in a position to donate, but we also know that there is immense value in building a large base of small, diverse donors. This matching campaign allowed us to engage those smaller donors and inspire them to be part of our final approach.

The Richardson
Foundation gift was the second matching donation opportunity as part of the capital campaign.
Prior to that, Bob Williams matched \$600,000 from more than 400 donors.
This new matching gift will help complete the campaign's goal.

Both matches, totaling \$1,350,000 were successful in leveraging another \$1,350,000 from 425 new donors from the community in 2022, bringing us very close to our campaign goal of \$48M.

ON THE MOVE

FTER OUR GRAND OPENING, THE NEXT BIG PROJECT ON OUR LIST WAS RELOCATING OUR COLLECTIONS STORAGE FROM A FACILITY ON CHURCH AVENUE.

THIS WAS NO SMALL FEAT CONSIDERING THE MUSEUM HAD SPENT TWO YEARS FILLING THE 27,000 SQ FT SPACE TO THE BRIM WITH RESTORATION, EXHIBIT AND COLLECTION MATERIALS.

In total, three aircraft, multiple engines and aircraft parts, and more than 2,700 boxes of artefacts and archival documents were moved to our new museum and a secondary storage facility on King Edward Street during a 10-week period.

This project required the coordination of staff and volunteers across multiple sites performing various tasks. Our volunteers worked tirelessly to get these materials safely to their destinations and are working to organize them into their forever homes.

The project was completed on September 30, 2022, and now that we have access to our collection, we are able to process research requests from the public!

ARIVALS

AMWC WELCOMED THREE NEW AIRCRAFT TO THE MUSEUM IN 2022, TWO OF WHICH ARE PERMANENT ADDITIONS TO OUR COLLECTION.

On July 13, the de Havilland Canada DHC-5 / CC-115 Buffalo arrived in Aviation Plaza courtesy of 17 Wing Winnipeg.

A short takeoff and landing utility transport aircraft first introduced in 1965, the Buffalo was highly successful as a military transport aircraft in more than 20 countries including Brazil, Egypt, and Canada.

In 1975, the RCAF Buffalo fleet was retired from its tactical airlift role and repurposed for domestic search and rescue duties. The bright yellow livery proved ideal for searching vast areas of ocean or wilderness. It also provides a stunning contrast to the exterior of our museum!

The last six RCAF Buffalos-including the museum's aircraft, #115462-served with No. 442 Transport and Rescue Squadron based in Comox, BC, until finally retired in 2022 after 55 years of service.

The DHC-5 will be on display until summer of 2023.



September 7, 2022, was a most exciting day at the museum!

In honour
of its 85th
anniversary, Air
Canada donated one
of the first six aircraft the airline
purchased, a Lockheed L-10A
Electra. This aircraft, CF-TCC, was
acquired by Trans Canada Airlines
(Air Canada's predecessor) in
1937 and used for pilot training in
Winnipeg before serving on TCA's
first scheduled passenger service
between Vancouver and Seattle.

The Electra boasted a host of modern features for its time including fully-retractable landing gear, streamlined NACA cowlings on the engines, and inflatable de-icer boots on the wings' leading edges.

Perhaps the most famous user of the Electra was American aviatrix Amelia Earhart who selected a Model 10E for her attempted roundthe-world flight in 1937. On July 2, 1937, Earhart and navigator Fred Noonan disappeared en route from Papua New Guinea to Howland Island in the south Pacific Ocean. Neither Earhart, Noonan, nor the aircraft were ever found, sparking a mystery that persists to this day.

Bringing the museum's on-site aircraft total to 25, on October 22, the Douglas A-26B Invader joined the CF-101 Voodoo and CC-115 Buffalo in Aviation Plaza.

> Purchased by Ross Robinson in 2007, this aircraft, C-GWLT, has a storied history dating back to 1944.

Lockheed L-10A Electra

Manufactured towards
the end of WWII, the
Invader-sometimes called
the "Badass Invader"-was
used extensively during the
Korean and Vietnam Wars and the
Bay of Pigs Invasion.

After their retirement in 1969, many of the aircraft ended up in civilian hands. C-GWLT was converted to a water bomber and used to combat forest fires.

Robinson acquired the plane specifically for use at airshows and to complement his 1952 Harvard Mark IV, explaining its eclectic livery.

Though it never flew with the RCAF, the Invader displays the air force logo and tail number 098, a nod to the *Trail of 98* in Yukon Territory.

Back in the 1970s, this aircraft operated as Invader 7 out of Air Spray's base in Whitehorse, YT, and pilots who flew her requested a name befitting her time there. The reference to the *Trail of 98* was chosen for its significance during the Klondike gold rush of 1898. The aircraft also bears the Manitoba flag and markers to commemorate the F-86 Sabre of the 439 Fighter Squadron.

AN ELECTRA-IC ARRIVAL

UR NEW MUSEUM GOT A LITTLE BIT SHINIER ON SEPTEMBER 7, 2022. WHEN WE WELCOMED THE LOCKHEED L-10A ELECTRA, CF-TCC, DONATED BY AIR CANADA IN CELEBRATION OF ITS **85TH ANNIVERSARY.**

The aircraft's all-metal body, polished to a high shine courtesy of museum volunteers, glistened in the morning light as the aircraft taxied into Aviation Plaza. The waiting crowd of media, Air Canada and museum employees, partners, and

supporters cheered and clapped as the vintage plane made its final approach and rolled to a stop in front of them.

Lockheed Aircraft introduced the eye-catching Model 10 Electra for use on short domestic routes in 1935 in response to its competitor's gathered around the aircraft to offerings. The early 1930s saw a revolution in commercial aviation as aircraft companies began introducing all-metal cantilever monoplanes - sleek, modern designs to the CF-104 Starfighter. which promised to make safe, reliable, and profitable passenger airline service a viable reality.

Former Air Canada Captains and Electra pilots Gerry Norberg and

Robert Giguere were behind the controls for the final ride from Air Canada's hangar over to the museum.

After a short program, Norberg and Giguere, along with Air Canada maintenance engineers George Huntington and Mike Clarkson, speak with attendees. Visitors were even able to climb aboard the Electra before it was moved into its final position in the museum, next

CF-TCC, was one of the first six aircraft purchased by the newlyformed Trans-Canada Airlines (TCA) in 1937. These aircraft were used for pilot training in Winnipeg before

serving on TCA's first scheduled passenger service between Vancouver and Seattle, the first 55-minute flight taking place on September 1, 1937.

After passing through multiple hands throughout the 20th century, CF-TCC was discovered in Florida in the 1980s by a vacationing Air Canada employee. The airline purchased the aircraft and had it transported back to Winnipeg, where it was meticulously restored by Air Canada

personnel. In 1987, CF-TCC was flown President & CEO Terry Slobodian. across Canada to celebrate Air Canada's 50th anniversary.

The addition of CF-TCC enhances the strong ties connecting RAMWC and historic TCA.

"We're very pleased that CF-TCC has landed at the Royal Aviation Museum and is now part of our permanent collection. This aircraft has ties to Winnipeg dating back to 1937 and to our museum in particular," notes Museum

"Our museum was previously located in the original TCA hangar here in Winnipeg and the Electra is a perfect picture of the early days of commercial air travel in Canada."

We're grateful to Air Canada for their longstanding support of our museum and for entrusting us with this spectacular piece of aviation history. It's the perfect addition to our collection and will be well-cared for by our team.

DEVELOPING DYNAMIC EXHIBITS

N APRIL 27, 2020, PCL
CONSTRUCTION BROKE
GROUND ON THE MUSEUM.
WITH ALL OF THE UNKNOWNS
AT THAT TIME, IT WAS A LEAP
OF FAITH. NONETHELESS,
CONSTRUCTION WAS

On August 6, 2021, we took possession of the new museum facility. The first task was the suspension of six aircraft followed by the "homecoming" of 10+ aircraft from various parts of the province. Our Exhibit Completion Task Force then went to work on the development of dynamic exhibits as laid out in its Strategic Plan.

In 2022, the focus was on completing the exhibit development work that started in 2021 including:

- Audio-visual content for 10 exhibit touch screens, three ambient soundscapes, and the Ghost of Charron Lake immersive object theatre.
- Interactive educational displays such as the roll-pitch-yaw Musketeer model in the Science of Flight Zone used in Take Flight! education programming.
- Stories and photos for exhibits.
 This involved diligent research, documentation of sources and references, community consultations, and fact-checking with partners and other subject matter experts to ensure accuracy of all museum content and to ensure all copyright requirements were met.
- Ensuring that the museum would achieve its objective of being a safe place for truth and reconciliation to occur. This involved vetting all content in our museum from an Indigenous perspective.
- Graphic production for exhibit display panels which were then fabricated and installed.

The museum's Strategic Plan includes four exhibit development goals. Two of these have been completed:

- Development of collections and conservation policies with processes and procedures that reflect current best practices in artefact preservation and restoration.
- Implementation of a strategic, longterm policy for collections development (including accessioning and deaccessioning-acquiring artefacts that reflect our mission and parting with those that don't).

And work continues on the following:

- Procurement and implementation of a cutting-edge collections management database platform.
- Maximizing access to, and utilization of, the collections and archives both on site and online.

In 2022, work also began on a QR code project to augment the text on exhibit panels. These QR codes will link exhibits to the RAMWC website where additional exhibit information will be found. This project will be completed in 2023.

PENING THE MUSEUM IN MAY 2022 WAS A HUGE ACCOMPLISHMENT FOR THE ENTIRE TEAM INVOLVED. STAFF, VOLUNTEERS, AND CONTRACTORS WORKED TIRELESSLY TO ENSURE THE COLLECTION WAS DISPLAYED SAFELY AND IN A WAY THAT IS ENGAGING AND INSPIRING.

Work done from 2020 to 2021 was to establish how our collection would be displayed in the new building. 2022 was spent installing the collection onto the main gallery floor. This was a monumental effort with the safety of artefacts and archival documents paramount to ensuring the opening date was met. Material delays caused by the COVID-19 pandemic meant that our team worked until the last possible moments to get everything ready.

Custom mounts were made for aircraft, artefacts, and archival documents throughout the museum thanks to the help of Paul Balcaen. The best mounts are those that cannot be seen and do not detract from the real attraction: the historic item.

Perhaps the most delicate installation in the museum was that of the Fokker Standard Universal G-CAJD, better known as the *Ghost of Charron Lake*. Having spent nearly 70 years under water and undergoing the affects of oxidization over the nearly two decades

since it was recovered, the Ghost is a large and incredibly fragile artefact.

In order to safely remove it from its storage crates

and mount it in a way that would support the remaining structure and prevent further deterioration. the museum hired professional museum mount-makers Dawn Carlisle and Nigel Bowers from County Workhouse. Together with a conservation consultant and RAMWC Collections Manager, Sandra Chewka, the team designed a mount that fit the exact shape and support required for the fuselage while remaining invisible for display. The trick came in placing the aircraft on the mount and lifting it with its mount into a custom-built display case. A team of at least 15 staff, contractors and volunteers were needed to physically move G-CAJD into place ensuring it was supported and secure the entire way.

Now in its case, the *Ghost* sits on display for the first time.


MARKETING & VISITOR EXPERIENCE

CAMPAIGNS AND SPECIAL EVENTS

FTER BEING CLOSED FOR FOUR YEARS, CURIOSITY AND ANTICIPATION FROM AVIATION ENTHUSIASTS BEGAN TO SOAR AS THE OPENING OF OUR BRAND-NEW, STATE-OF-THE-ART MUSEUM APPROACHED.

In the weeks leading up to the grand opening, an awareness campaign featuring the revised brand and iconic peak of the new museum was launched. History is Landing ads appeared in paid online and social media campaigns and across Winnipeg in an out-of-home campaign with transit and outdoor billboards.

Earned media coverage helped create even more buzz in the marketplace, resulting in website visits between January to May





increasing by 151% compared to the previous year. Overall, website page views increased by 262% with over 429,000 page views in 2022.

In 2022, the Museum received 94 earned media stories from outlets including Canadian Aviation News, Skies Mag, Yahoo! News, Winnipeg Free Press, CBC Manitoba, CTV News (local and national) and CJOB.

Social media was also instrumental to the museum's marketing strategy, with hundreds of visitors creating their own content while visiting the museum and engaging with our content.

Across the RAMWC's main social channels (Facebook, Instagram, LinkedIn and Twitter), the museum earned over 3,399,000 impressions with 132,431 engagements and audience growth of 272%.

While the first few months of the year were spent preparing for the museum's grand opening and the anticipation of a busy summer season, the Marketing and Visitor Experience team also created additional programming and events to attract visitors.

The results? In the first nine months, volunteers and staff welcomed approximately 65,000 paid visitors into our new museum. In addition to visitors from Winnipeg and across Canada, thanks to the new location on the Winnipeg Richardson International Airport campus, the museum also hosted many international visitors from countries including the United States, Mexico, Ireland, United Kingdom, and Switzerland.


CHRISTMAS CARGO

The mission of the RAMWC Centre of Excellence is to deliver an experience that informs and inspires youth about specific careers in the aviation and aerospace industries, connecting them with resources to pursue these careers and provide handson experience and training while removing as many barriers as possible.

To achieve this goal, and to be in a position to partner with Manitoba's leading academic institutions at the elementary, secondary and post-secondary levels, we needed to enhance, expand and improve our

Take Flight! education programs, and build partnerships within the community.

In September, we launched five new STEM courses, bringing us to a total of 14 programs, 13 of which are STEM curriculum-based. These new programs were designed by Maria Nickel and Brian Ewenson.

Maria is a winner of the Prime Ministers Award for Canadian National Teacher of the Year, a Canadian Space Agency Astronaut Recruitment selection

We also hired two new museum educators in 2022. Both certified teachers, they have done a remarkable job of bringing Maria's and Brian's programs to life and inspiring students of all ages.

Strategic partnerships, such as the ones we have with the Winnipeg School Division (WSD) and another with the Manitoba Institute of Trades and Technology (MITT) are another integral part of the Centre of Excellence. Our partnerships are focused on:

- Educational programming that supports curriculum learning outcomes.
- Exploration of careers and pathways to employment in the aviation and aerospace industry.

 Engaging underrepresented groups, specifically Indigenous and female students in STEM education, and in aviation and aerospace and related careers.

Upcoming initiatives of our WSD partnership include a career fair and three, one-week residency programs for WSD1 schools which will immerse students in the museum and our programming. MITT, supported by museum volunteers, will provide design and manufacturing assistance for museum projects. The first initiative of this partnership is the design and manufacture of a wind tunnel to be used in our Science of Flight zone for education for our students and visitors.

Our innovative and engaging Science of Flight zone is the heart of all our educational programming and was made possible thanks to a generous \$1M donation from the Tallman family that will enable us to inspire students for years to come.



OUR NEW PROGRAMS

TOYS IN SPACE: In this investigation, students play the role of scientists and STEM engineers in examining the physics of popular toys on Earth and space.

INVISIBLE FORCES:

Students construct and test a gravity assist device in three challenges, learning about Newton's three laws and the Design Engineering Process.

SHIP THE CHIP: Acting as a team of manufacturing engineers, students are given the challenge of designing the smallest, lightest package possible using everyday materials.

save the suit: Student teams design, construct, and test a model spacesuit through various challenges using Scientific Inquiry and the engineering design process to protect astronaut Mark Whatney's spacesuit from damage.

GREEN FUEL ROCKETS:

Students design an environmentally friendly "green" spacecraft propellant. They will then test their propellant using a variety of surface areas, solid fuel and temperatures of liquid fuel, measuring the thrust produced.



ENSURED INDIGENOUS VOICES
AND PERSPECTIVES WERE REPRESENTED AND WOVEN INTO THE
STORIES OF OUR NEW MUSEUM.

One of these stories, the Felixstowe repair at Pikangikum Lake has been in our collection for 40 years. The story is told through a series of photographs containing images of unnamed-until recently-individuals.


The museum's account of this story was always one-sided as the identities of the Indigenous men in the photos were unknown, so staff contacted Pikangikum First Nation for help.

Museum staff and volunteers were introduced to Gerald Neufeld and his father who were doing ancestral

research in Pimachiowin Aki. The museum shared photographs taken in 1922 at Pikangikum, which included several community members helping repair Felixstowe G-CYBT. They were successful in identifying two individuals in the photographs: Peter Quill, great grandfather of Chief Dean Owen, and Abraham Keeper, both community leaders whose descendants make up a large portion of Pikangikum's population today.

We remain in contact with Pikangikum First Nation in an effort to identify additional individuals in the photos and facilitate access to these and other photographs. The oldest images of their relatives that the community knows to exist.

This project is an example of a larger initiative to identifying Indigenous people in photographs and archives, providing awareness and access to these records, and decolonizing the museum's collection.

RAMWC is committed to the calls to action of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, and to facilitating a safe space for reconciliation to occur. As part of this commitment, we were honoured to welcome and provide complimentary admission to 2,032 Indigenous visitors in 2022.

LINWOOD STREET MEMORIAL

On June 24, 1972, a plane carrying eight students attending residential schools in Stonewall and Portage la Prairie, bound for Bunibonibee Cree Nation (formerly Oxford House), crashed on a vacant lot on Linwood Street in Winnipeg shortly after takeoff.

Students Margaret Robinson, Mary Rita Canada, Ethel Grieves, Rosalie Balfour, Wilkie Muskego, Iona Weenusk, and siblings Roy and Deborah Sinclair, along with pilot Scott Coughlin, all died in the crash.

While there is a memorial for the victims in Long Plain First Nation

where two of the students attended school, no memorial exists at the crash site in Winnipeg.

After receiving funding from the Queen's Platinum Jubilee Fund through Manitoba Sport, Culture and Heritage to support activities that will advance reconciliation and enhance Manitoba's efforts towards creating a more equitable and inclusive society, the museum set out plans to honour the students.


When city councillor (now Mayor of Winnipeg) Scott Gillingham heard the story and the museum's plans to erect a monument to honour the victims, he became invested in the project and plans evolved to include a park and plaza area, thanks to additional support from the City of Winnipeg.

We commissioned a solid polished granite pedestal engraved with the names of the students and pilots, and the city is creating a small park with seating areas and trees selected by family members, one to honour each of the victims.

Due to the scope of the project, the plaza area is now expected to be completed in June of 2023.

56-YEAR LEASE

The Royal Aviation Museum holds 86,000 square foot of display space, offices, classrooms, meeting rooms, and archival storage on four acres of Winnipeg Airport Authority (WAA) land allowing for indoor and outdoor displays and programming.

From admissions to venue rentals, from the high-end Landing Zone Boutique to school programming, this purpose-built facility is the heart (but not the only piece) of RAMWC's facility footprint.

There are two other facilities in our portfolio that help to drive revenue and fulfill our public trust commitment to care for aviation heritage and artefacts.

3 INDUSTRIAL ROAD, ST. ANDREWS

MUSEUM-OWNED PROPERTY

Located 31 kilometres from the museum, the St. Andrews storage facility is comprised of two buildings totalling approximately 9,500 square feet of space on approximately two acres of land.

Neither building is climate controlled and artefacts in this indoor space are subjected to temperature and humidity swings, but are kept predominantly out of the weather. Only the sturdiest of artefacts can be safely stored in this environment, particularly in the outdoor storage yard.

There is a long-term plan to identify options for divesting the museum of this space and moving the artefacts to a more appropriate facility closer to the museum.

1500 KING EDWARD STREET

FIVE-YEAR LEASE

This space contains 15,000 square feet of collections storage, restoration facilities, and new building material storage. Located approximately three kilometres from the new museum, this facility allows for climate-controlled storage of archival artefacts and a safe and comfortable space for restoration projects.

The new museum building was designed with minimal storage space and therefore much of the extra exhibit and building materials have been moved offsite to this facility. Having ready access to the rest of our collection and a space for our restoration team gives us the ability to change out exhibits and enhance our displays continuously, keeping the museum fresh and boosting repeat visitation.

The move from our prior storage facility on Church Avenue was completed in late summer of 2022. Organization is ongoing and electrical and welding improvements are planned to aid in the completion of upcoming projects.
